September Meeting



Former Belmont Abbey president dies

Former Belmont Abbey College President Robert Preston died at noon on Saturday, Aug. 20 in High Point of pancreatic cancer, said his wife, Helen, of 53 years.



She said Preston, 80, found out he had terminal pancreatic cancer on July 26 after a visit to the doctors' office. He attended a family reunion in the western part of the United States in July when he began not feeling well. He was diagnosed shortly after returning to their apartment in a High

Point retirement community. Helen Preston said her husband's cancer diagnosis and death happened "very fast."

He graduated from Belmont Abbey College in 1953 and would go on to serve as president from 1995-2001. The Prestons moved from their home at Lake Wylie, S.C., to High Point in 2008.


Oblate study for 2011 and 2012

Michael Casey on "Fully Human, Fully Divine"

Below is an interview of Fr. Casey January, 2010: Fully Human, Fully Divine, which I think is my best book, is really just closely tied to the Gospel [of Mark] but it's also, in a very clear way, a continuation, if I wanted to be ambitious, of what the Cistercian Fathers were doing. By taking

the Scriptures and interpreting them in a behavioristic kind of light and drawing in our own contemporary experience.... It's being read in a lot of Benedictian refectories. The two biggest Benedictian communities

in this country, which is Saint Vincent Archabbey in Latrobe, Pennsylvania and Saint John's Collegeville, in both, every monk received a copy of it. It's unabashedly from the Cistercian end of the Benedictian spectrum, it's talking about Cistercian values, but I was interested in just the wide spread acceptance of what I had to say. It tells me to trust in my own instincts. To say what I want to say and if people want to hear it, they will hear it. Perhaps, as often happens, they will hear more than I thought I was saying. So it's a very monastic book which has had a wide readership. It's a bit the same with Thomas Merton. His most monastic writings are the one that people seem to enjoy the most.

Question: Are your non-monastic readers challenged by your work?

Fr Michael Casey: I hope so, I suspect so. They try to put my writings into their context. I think that's far more realistic for the reader to put it into his or her context than for me to try and imagine where the reader might be and try to talk to that imaginary person. Desert Wisdom: If you do not strive, you will not find

Look what good things occur to someone as a result of divine care! Sometimes, when a person is on his knees at the time of prayer, with his hands outspread or extended heavenwards, his eyes gazing on the Cross, and

with the whole movement of his mind, as it were, stretched towards God in entreaty, during the time while such a person is thus engaged in supplication and groanings, all of a sudden a fountain of sweetness is stirred up from his heart. His limbs become feeble, his sight dim, he bows his head; his thoughts are altered and he can no longer kneel on the ground as a result of the exultation at the sign of grace which surges through his entire body.

Therefore, my reader, pay attention to what you are reading. Indeed, can such things as these be known from writings in ink? Can the taste of honey pass over from a written text to the palate of the reader?

If you do not strive, you will not find; and if you do not knock eagerly at the door and keep long vigil before it, you will not receive an answer.
