### **Meeting in March**

Oblates will meet on the third Sunday in March on the 18th. The meeting will be held as usual in the Gallagher Room.

Brother Edward asked that the oblates and novices to: continue reading and reflecting on four items for the meeting:

- 1) Read Chapter 3 in Michael Casey's "Toward God."
- 2) Please take a peek at Chapter 49, Observance of Lent, in "The Rule" booklet.
- 3) Chew on the meaning of the Lord's Prayer and its context related to the other readings.

Oblate novices will discuss "Part Two: Monastic Steps, Step 3: Obedience" in "Finding Sanctuary" by Abbot Christopher Jamison. Novices will meet in the Gallagher Room one hour before the regular meeting.

#### The Glory of these Forty Days

Hymns are much more than noises made to accompany church activities like the entry and exit of the clergy and the collection of the offering. Our hymns embody the teaching of the church, and even for those who "cannot sing," there is a wealth of inspiration, comfort, remembrance and support for the Christian walk contained in a Hymnal's pages. We can find in hymns the particular help we need during Lent for the self-examination, confession, prayer and fasting that are essential if we are to be prepared for Resurrection. Let us take a brief look at one of the Lenten hymns of the church: The glory pf these forty days.

This hymn is very old, dating to the tenth century or earlier – it has sometimes been attributed to

Gregory the Great (sixth century). So, since the Dark Ages, this hymn has been bringing light into the lives of Christians.

The forty days of which it speaks are the forty days of Christ's temptation. The Gospel according to Mark tells us that the Spirit drove Jesus into the desert to be tempted. Being driven and being tempted do not match our ideas of glory; this just means that, as usual, we have gotten it wrong. It suggests a different possibility for our Lenten discipline. It suggests that we not expect to be gloomily deprived of some favorite food or activity, to contemplate with increasing resentment the cause of it all – Jesus and His Church. The hymn teaches us to celebrate and sing praises during Lent – which we can do because we know how the story ends.

The inner verses of the hymn remind us that fasting and prayer have historically led, not to misery and deprivation, but to visions of the glorious future God has prepared for us. The examples of the patriarchs and prophets, which we will do well to spend time re-reading and meditating on during Lent, lead us back to singing the praises of our Triune God. So, strengthened

by God's angels, may we prepare with joy for the coming feast of the Resurrection of Our Lord.

The glory of these forty days
We celebrate with songs of praise;
For Christ, by Whom all things were made,
Himself has fasted and has prayed.

Alone and fasting Moses saw The loving God Who gave the law; And to Elijah, fasting, came The steeds and chariots of flame.

So Daniel trained his mystic sight, Delivered from the lions' might; And John, the Bridegroom's friend, became The herald of Messiah's Name.

Then grant us, Lord, like them to be Full oft in fast and prayer with Thee; Our spirits strengthen with Thy grace, And give us joy to see Thy face.

O Father, Son, and Spirit blest, To thee be every prayer addressed, Who art in threefold Name adored, From age to age, the only Lord.
